## **Principal's Report**



This year has been a very busy year - a year where many new changes took affect. Change for change sake is not good but the changes we had this year were to improve teaching and learning.

Some of the significant changes that took place were: six month options in Year 9, a new timetable structure, a new timetabler, a new structure for the day, a 25 period week, new courses been offered. D block opening, new teachers, new PC computer suite, MidYis testing introduced, reaccredited as an 'Investors in People' school, three new Board members, a Gifted and Talented programme in place, a School Review and continued roll growth.

The changes have made a significant difference to the way curriculum has been delivered. It has been a good year.

The highlight for the year was the India Tour. This trip was a fantastic experience for the Year 11-13 students who took part. Over the past

year and a half the students worked very hard to raise the money for the trip. The trip was well supported by the school community and the parents of the participants. The trip was not hassle free and there were long periods of sitting in a bus. The students did not moan when things went wrong. The students were a credit to themselves, a credit to their families and a credit to Tuakau College. Well done! It was a life-long experience and the students do appreciate living in Tuakau more and as well as living in New Zealand.

We also delivered the College's first Service Quality Survey-a School Review. The results show that the College is doing very well and that the Staff are committed to making a difference to the education of the students of Tuakau. There are always things to improve on and we intend to look at the things the survey points out and aim to improve on these next year. Achievement is the key. Teachers and families are two thirds of the important equation for success. Students have an essential role in this. This whakatauki explains

Tama tu. tama ora Tama moe, tama mate He who stands, lives He who sleeps, dies

Students need to be responsible for their own achievement. Their desire to learn and their self-motivation will give them the opportunity to succeed. They need to be positive, and not give up no matter how hard things get. Stand-up and make it count - do not lie

There are three important threads to a student's life - sporting, academic and cultural threads. All these thread intertwine to form the student's life at school. Some threads are significantly stronger than others whereas some are evenly matched.

The academic results gained last year were very good in some areas and some areas needed attention but overall the students, especially in Year 11, did very well with many of them gaining more than 160 credits. Planning for achievement is the key and I know many are studying hard to ensure good results this year.

The school and the students have had another big year in the sporting arena. The students have played with grit and determination and have also obeyed the fair play code of conduct. Well done to all the sports people for a fine year. Sport is an aspect of a student's life that gets them out of the classroom and onto a court or field where they can excel and enjoy themselves. It is another "string to their bow". I hope that many more students will take up some kind of sport in 2006. The opportunities are there - for example we had 14 netball teams this year and they all did very well.

Tuakau College is a culturally rich school with students performing in drama, music, kapa haka and dance. Kapa haka did extremely well in their competitions and the Music Awards evening was a great success. We intend to try to increase the opportunities in Drama next year. Thank you for enriching us all.

This year has been a very fulfilling year. The students have continued to maintain high standards of personal behaviour. We are always willing to encourage the students to behave positively and looking for new ways to motivate students to work. The school is in good heart and we will always continue to make this a safe environment for students to succeed in and achieve their potential and beyond.

The Staff work extremely hard to provide the learning opportunities for all abilities. I believe we "Add Value" to the students that walk through our gates and that they leave us balanced young citizens.

## **Board Report**

Tuakau College has had another terrific year of achievement and growth.

As always there are many worthy projects that we would like to complete but only so much money to go towards them. Priorities now have to be worked out and acted upon.

The BOT has decided to go to mid-term elections, which means that every 18 months, three parent positions on the Board will be up for re-election. This will help keep an experienced core on our Board, as all positions cannot change at any one election. I would like to thank Ross Galbreath, Russell Brewster and Willie Heteraka for all of their input, time and efforts over the last 4.5 years for the betterment of our school. At the same time we welcome Michele Carter, James Lowry and Kevin Powell onto the Board and I am sure that they have a lot of fresh ideas to offer. We are also always looking for ideas and input from the community on anything that will make the school a better place for our children.

The Board, as part of its review process, was very interested in the results of the Service Quality Survey, which was carried out in Term 3. We intend to act positively towards the recommendations and as a Board always welcome and look for new ways to improve the things we do at Tuakau College. We are not perfect and strive to do the very best in all things.

Finally, and most importantly, the Board of Trustees would like to acknowledge the efforts of the exceptional teaching and nonteaching staff that we are fortunate to have at Tuakau College. We started the year with a new Principal (Mr. Chris Betty) and Deputy Principal (Mr. Ronnie Walia) and I believe that through the efforts of all teaching and administration staff we have continued to provide education in line with the school motto of 'The Very Best In All Things'. It is a credit to every member of staff when we, as parents, are constantly reminded by people throughout the Franklin area that they have heard about 'all the good things' happening at Tuakau



#### Who is the person you most admire and why?



This year Tuakau College has been lucky to have two AFS exchange students, Juan Vera Morales and Mikala Sorensen, both in Year 12.




#### Juan Vera Morales



## Hayley Purdon 7KB The Glow Worms



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

# INDIA 2005 (20)

## The Trip of a Lifetime - Two Students Perspectives

Tuesday the 20th of September, over a year since the idea of a school trip to India was conceived, and here we were, 87 of us, students, parents, and teachers. Even though it had been months of waiting, it seemed to come around a lot faster than anyone expected, before we knew it we were on the bus, and then within a few hours, we were sitting on a plane destined for a country half way around the world. 20 or so hours later and we landed in Calcutta, straight away a mixture of heat, awful smells, and random guys asleep on fire hydrants made us realize that we were actually in India.

The first day was a free day for most of us; however the Kapa Haka had a performance at the British High Commission for the Indian Press. It went very well; everyone was very impressed at how professional they were.

The next day we went to the first of three schools that we would be visiting, however this school was a little bit different. It was called Future Hope School. This was a school for homeless children who had been picked up off the streets of Calcutta, and given a bed to sleep in, along with the chance to get an education. This was an amazing experience, the children first showed us around, pointing out classrooms, and bunk rooms where they slept. Next then performed many different dances and songs, some Indian, some western. They were obviously very excited and eager to show us their skills. Later on in the night, after the arrival of five boys who saw a very different side of Calcutta, the Kapa Haka group performed several songs and a Haka for the children. They loved it, and as soon as it was over, they ran up to all the performers to hug and congratulate them on a great performance.

After recovering from that humbling night, it was off to the rugby fields to play against Future Hope in a game of Touch Rugby for the girls, and a game of both Seven's and fifteen aside rugby for the boys. The Touch was an exhibition match, with most our girls playing against each other. I'm sure they all enjoyed playing in probably the muddiest rugby ground in all of India. The boys then played their game of Sevens, it was very close, and in the end we ended up losing by one try. We had to redeem ourselves, and the Fifteens was our chance, it was very competitive, both teams we putting in huge hits (just ask Willie) and no team was holding back, but in the end we managed to grind out a convincing win, over a side that looked exactly like us, the mud made it pretty hard to tell the two teams apart.

After a few days of local sight seeing, that included the Queen Victoria Memorial, Eden Gardens Cricket Stadium (the largest of its kind in the world), and Mother Theresa's Temple, a very spiritual and awe-inspiring place, we went for a ferry trip down the Ganges River. We were hosted by the Calcutta River Police, and saw some very interesting sights, men showering in the river water, local children swimming, and "apparently" a dolphin??

The Delhi stage of our trip was next, however to get to New Delhi, we had to travel by train for just over 17 hrs. Most people won't forget being crammed into the wrong compartment, or spending hours on end with complete strangers, definitely an experience.

Once in Delhi we visited several important monuments, included, was Gandhi's memorial, a very important man in Indian, and World history. Next was our trip to Bal Bharati High School, a school with around 4500 students. We listened in to their morning report, joined in lots of different sports, then sat in on some classes around the school, it was very different to life at Tuakau College.

Off to Agra to see the Taj Mahal, a long bus ride, filled with snake charmers, and guys with both monkeys and bears on leashes, all outside the bus window. Once inside the Taj Mahal, we were stunned, it was surreal. We spent hours just walking around, taking photos, and enjoying such an awesome sight. Lucas was even lucky enough to say he spent his 18th birthday at the Taj Mahal.

Our next big adventure was to the Corbett National Park, to go on Safari. After the six hour bus trip turned into a thirteen hour bus trip, we arrived very tired. It was an amazing place, where we had elephant rides, and saw spiders bigger than my hand. Unfortunately however no tigers, but we had a great time just relaxing in the jungle.

The last school that we visited was Delhi Public School, this school had a roll of 10 000 students! It was huge. Again we played sports; they were very competitive, however we were all pretty casual and had a good time enjoying their wicked facilities.

A few more days spent in and around Delhi, where we got to experience the markets, the people, the Indian McDonalds, and were able to get some last minute shopping in before we departed India.

As we left India, we were sad to go, but also relieved knowing that we would be back in New Zealand soon. 
#### Highlights from the capital of India included

## **Book Week 2005**


Tuakau College's annual book week took place during the last week of Term III. This was the third year that we have celebrated 'Book Week' and this year even more events were included.

## Crest

The CREST programme was carried out by Mrs. Clarke's Year7 Science class during Term 2 this year. CREST is not a competition, all the students receive a certificate from the CREST organisation, based on their achievements, Examples of CREST projects include; developing plastic from milk products, different types of dog food, comparing different brands of Coca-Cola and comparing soil types and seed germination rates.

Unfortunately the Yr 13 team was balloted out due to record numbers of team entries. This was naturally disappointing. We did our cleaning for the day then morning tea.



To give you a bit of an idea of my Dad's reaction after I told him, think 'apocalypse'!, caused by me slightly denting the second car they bought for me to use. You see, it's hard for me, I can see both points of view, an unwanted gift, especially since I should be focussing on defending my story. From my side, I think it was an unfortunate happening, resulting from a number of contributing factors, the fact that I was tired, and therefore inattentive, how quickly the cars in front slammed on their brakes, and the distracting kids playing on the sidewalk. My parents, unfortunately see it in a different light; two crashed cars in under six months. I can understand their anger and punishment choices, but I am not sure whether I agree with them.

The sole survivor interviewed after recovering from the accident tells of how he could see the speedometer climbing up, past 170km per hour, the driver steering with one hand and texting with the other. The passengers begged him to slow down, his reply? "I can handle my car". That's the problem right there, teenagers think they are invincible when it comes to driving. They never think it can happen to them, and then one day, it does. Maybe even twice like me.

The long term solution to this epidemic is foggy. What can we do in the meantime to better these figures? Drive carefully. From me, an apology for my poor driving skills, perhaps the 'Pro Drive' course I will do in a few weeks will help me to keep my eyes wide open. so that next time I can try and avoid the avoidable.
