Along with winter come the ills and chills. Please, if your child is sick make sure you keep them at home otherwise they will only turn up to school to be sent home again by the school Nurse.

## Koorero a te Tumuaki Haere tonu. . . *The Principal speaks continued. . .*

I would like to give a special shout out to all of our students that abide by and respect the school rules. Rules are put in place for students safety and so everyone can enjoy school in a respectable environment. Sometimes rules aren't always fun to follow as children, and we understand that, but right through life there will be rules, even in the workplace/universities/tertiary education/etc. A massive thank you to all of our students that work together with us by abiding by the rules.

Our motto is 'pai rawa atu i nga mea katoa, the very best in all things' and that is what we want for each of our students. Please, if your child is having any issues/problems/concerns at school let someone at the school know so that we can try to help. We have to know to be able to support your child/children and you as parents/caregivers. We ask that you, as parents/caregivers, also please keep communicating with your children and listen to what they are telling you. We all, as a community, need to be there cohesively for our tamariki. It takes a village.

This weekend is a 'long weekend' for our students as we have a Staff Only Day today, a public holiday (Kings Birthday) on Monday 3 June and a Staff Only Day on Tuesday 4 June. The school is closed for instruction to students today for one of the Staff Only Day's that the Ministry of Education has given for dedicated time for staff to engage with the significant changes across the integrated Curriculum and Assessment Change Programme within Te Poutahu. The school will be closed for instruction to students on Tuesday 4 June for a Staff Only Day that is a 'Kaahui Ako' Staff Only Day involving professional development for a number of schools across the district all together. As the Principal cannot provide adequate supervision for students on these dates, the Board would appreciate parents/caregivers making alternative arrangements for their child/children.

The Franklin Transport Network Group, which provides schools buses for Tuakau College, have been working very hard to rationalise bus runs and provide a service that is appropriate for all the schools in the network. They have had to do this because of the funding changes and the determination of eligibility of students by the Ministry of Education, as per previous correspondence regarding this. The Franklin Transport Network Group have managed to do this but unfortunately our present bus provider (Ritchie's) is not ready for these changes due to commercial issues. In this light, and after reviewing the budget, the Franklin Transport Network Group has decided to postpone any changes to the network group buses until the beginning of Term 3, which is a 7 week reprieve. So, on the 5th of June the Franklin Transport Network Group school buses will run as per normal until the end of term.

The only exception to this is the Pukekohe bus, which has stopped and no longer operates. Its last run was yesterday. All students that need to get to school and back from Pukekohe will need to use the public transport BUSIT bus, as per previous correspondence. They can access this from the Buckland Street entrance to the college. We appreciate your understanding and patience in this matter.

A reminder that physical violence is totally unacceptable at Tuakau College. We have some students that continue to use physical violence to try and resolve issues and this is totally unacceptable. The Tuakau College Board take a hard line on this and this has been reiterated in school assemblies, where students have been told that using physical violence to solve issues will have serious consequences. The Board will continue to ensure this is a safe place and will continue to exclude or suspend students if they do not adhere to the warnings around the use of physical violence. Students that are recording incidences and/or sharing recordings on social media are just as bad as those using physical violence and they too will be dealt with. The Board wants to reassure the community that they will continue to ensure this is a safe place for our tamariki. Enjoy your long weekend!

## Samoan Language Week *Te Wiki o te Reo Hamoa*



The 2024 theme for Samoa Language Week was 'Tautua i le alofa, manuia le lumana'i – Serve in love for a blessed future.' This year's theme was prepared by SAASIA – The Association of Aoga Amata (Samoan early childhood centres) in New Zealand. It focuses on tautua (service) and aims to clearly express the significance of service that is founded on love – "Love is the driving force of service. No matter what service looks like or who is doing it, service is accomplished through the power of love.

SAASIA further elaborates on this theme, affirming that maintaining the Samoan language is also achieved through service - through the Samoan values of alofa (love), fa'aaloalo (respect), and especially in the vā fealoa'i (respectful relationships) that guide and protect Samoan people. Service begins in the family and continues in schools, villages, churches, communities, and wherever Samoan people are. The ongoing mission, therefore, is the collective preservation of language and identity for Samoan children into the future.

## The Ripple Effect of kindness *Te hua ripple o te atawhai*



**Imagine a world where a simple smile, a kind word, or a moment of understanding can set off a cascade of positive change.** Like a ripple effect - where a small, seemingly insignificant action can snowball into something truly monumental. When we are kind, we inspire others to be kind, and it creates a ripple effect that spreads outwards. Just as a pebble creates waves when it is dropped in a pond, acts of kindness ripple outwards, touching others lives and inspiring kindness everywhere the wave goes.

Research has shown that people who witness kind acts are often motivated to perform a kind act themselves. There is a ripple effect with kindness, but the difference being that instead of spreading emotions such as fear and anger, these ripple effects spread emotions such as love and compassion. You may notice it yourself when you see other people being kind, and you're inspired to do something kind as well. One simple act of kindness could affect hundreds if not thousands of people in the same way as an act of aggression or anger can do.

There is a saying that the best way to change the world is one person at a time, which of course means talking to an awful lot of people. But if we can set the dominoes in motion by starting a ripple of kindness then that one person we affect will go on to affect others. Before long we have numerous ripples branching out in all directions.

These acts can be as simple as paying someone a compliment, allowing someone out in front of you when driving. Smiling or chatting to some who is having a bad day can in a moment totally change the dynamic. The best thing is all these gestures are free, and yet they can summon up all the happy chemicals they make us feel good about life.

So, when faced with a choice between being kind or oppressive, that choice can have far reaching consequences, far beyond the person who it is aimed at. That means every day, every one of us has a chance to influence our world and if enough people choose kindness then it could tip the balance away from a world of continual conflict to one of mutual co-operation. We all have that power within us.

Acts of kindness have been found to boost feelings of well-being, increase our support networks, and even lead to positive changes in the brain associated with happiness. But the benefits of kindness go beyond personal well-being. They create a sense of belonging, reduce isolation, and strengthen social connections. Acts of kindness help us make new friends, connect with our communities, and combat loneliness. Kindness also provides a different perspective on life, fostering feelings of happiness, optimism, and satisfaction.

It's also really important to be kind to yourself. The way we treat ourselves carries over to how we treat others. So, for example, if you're happy, well-rested, and at peace with yourself, you're more likely to be patient, giving, and kinder to others. Practicing self-care, self-compassion, and self-love means accepting ourselves for who we are, recognizing that mistakes don't define us, and doing things that will benefit our mental and physical health. When we value and take care of ourselves, we're in a better position to do the same for others.

Let's all do our bit in adding to the ripple effect of kindness - in our whaanau's, in our school, in our community and in our world.
