You will notice that we have two new pou (carvings) at the Elizabeth Street entrance to our school. These have been installed as part of our Golden Jubilee celebrations during the holidays. More information about these pou and what they mean can be found further in this e-Bulletin. A massive thank you to ex-student, Uenuku Hawira, for all his work on these pou. They look beautiful and we are pleased to have them to welcome students, parents/caregivers, staff and all others into our kura.

At the start of Term 2 we have some timetable changes and we appreciate your understanding in this. The decision was made to dissolve 9R as a class and move these students into the other Year 9 core classes. This is due to Whaea Ariana leaving and we haven't been able to find a replacement for her as yet. We also haven't been able to find a replacement hard materials teacher for Wood and Metal technology. This has meant some Year 9 and 10 option classes have had to be removed from the timetable. The students that this affected were all spoken to by Mrs Fletcher at the end of Term 1 and they have picked new options for this term. I know it is not ideal having students moving into the other option classes after a term of learning but unfortunately we don't have much other choice. This is not unique to Tuakau College as New Zealand faces a large shortage in teachers. Most applicants for teaching job advertisements across the country are from overseas.

At the start of Term 2 we have also had a change to our school bell/timetable times. Information on this was emailed to all parents/caregivers at the end of Term 1. Please make note of these new times.

Winter will be upon us shortly. Tuakau College is a uniform school so please ensure your child has the correct uniform when attending school. Non-uniform items will be confiscated. Please re-read the uniform policy items if you are unsure. This can be found on the Tuakau college website. Our uniform looks smart when it is worn correctly and we often get compliments from other schools, members of the community, etc. about how good our students look in their uniforms. Be proud of your school and wear your uniform correctly with pride. It is a good habit to get into to prepare you for the workforce.

A friendly reminder about school sports conduct and how we expect our students and spectators to behave and fair play. They represented our school with pride and Shreya Reddy (Head Student) did a fantastic job speaking on behalf of the kura. Her speech can be read below. We remember them, we will remember them. Lest we forget.













SHREYA REDDY'S ANZAC SPEECH:

We are gathered to acknowledge and pay our respects to the soldiers and elders past and present. We acknowledge their sacrifice in warfare and the contribution and suffering of all those who have served for our country. I was asked to write a speech explaining what ANZAC day means to me as a young citizen of Aotearoa. Although I was born here my roots do not originate from Aotearoa, but ANZAC day never fails to make me feel pride and strength as an individual. People perceive ANZAC day in many different ways, some of which being deceased soldiers/loved ones or cookies. I like to see ANZAC day from a different perspective, being a way of bonds. Aotearoa and Australia built an unbreakable bond through this time of hardship where we had to lean on each other to succeed. This bond strengthens itself on 25 April every year. But only on this specific day. When it's the All Blacks vs the Wallabies it's a whole different story. But no matter what, when the time comes and we need one another we don't hesitate to stand beside each other, to fight for each other and protect one another regardless of what that could mean for ourselves. In today's world this can be seen at our kura. We may brawl and sigh at the presence of one another but we have this bond that runs through all our whaanau at Tuakau College where we know we have the support of each other and can always lean on each other. We put our differences aside and unite together as one. Each individual holds a unique strength and together, as one, we are more powerful than we could ever be by ourselves. This encourages the will to speak up, seek help and reach out which benefits us as young kiwi kids in numerous ways.

ANZAC Day has become an occasion to honour all who have worn our country's uniform in service. We are here today to reflect on that service. We recognise more than a hundred thousand women and men who lost their lives in military operations whilst carrying our country's name with mana. ANZAC Day is a day to remember all New Zealanders and Australians who gave their lives in all wars, conflicts and peacekeeping missions around the world. It is a time to remember and thank those who have served and continue to serve in the Australian and New Zealand Armies. To some ANZAC Day is just another public holiday, another day to sleep in or another day off school and work. But there is a deeper meaning to this day. This day ensures that stories about our heroes and our history are passed down to our tamariki to help them better understand the value and need for peace, in not just our kura or Aotearoa but anywhere we may be. ANZAC Day provides us with the opportunity to reach deeper within ourselves, our whaanau and our ancestors.

Today we wear these poppies with mana, pride and as a symbol of our remembrance and hope for a peaceful future in the aftermath of the First World War. We stand tall and strong as an outcome of our tupuna who served for us. For our peace and for the world that we grow in today. Lest we forget.

The pou were named on the morning of Monday 22 April, 2024 (morning of the blessing/unveiling). Their names are 'Tuaahua' and 'Hinekura.' Each person can make their own interpretations of 'Tuaahua' but basically it means to stand with your own and stand in your own – with your identity and your mana and to help tautoko everyone else's. 'Tuaahua' means to almost stand and shine. 'Hinekura' has more of an embracing feel to it. The carver combined a lot of the korero from Maaoritanga and our culture and acknowledged certain aspects that are sort of vital to the waharoa to be the gateway inviting people in and protecting and looking after people and encouraging them, etc.

For each person that has been through Tuakau College, what is consistent is that each person has found their passion of some sort, through struggles and triumph. They have all reached their own versions of success. That's what our taonga's (the pou) are about - to help everyone find their own successes. Not just for students but for everyone.

As we acknowledge the past with the unveiling of the plaque, we also acknowledge the 50 years to come with the unveiling of the pou. These structures that are put up are subtle reminders of that responsibility and as we refer to 'Tuaahua' and 'Hinekura' the purposes of those two pou is to ensure that we set a strong foundation for our tamariki/kids and our community.
