... Earlier this month we had a new electronic sign installed at our Buckland Road entrance to the school. This is awesome and is a great way to share information to our community. This new sign is partly the result of a kind exstudent who sponsored half of the cost of the electronic sign (following our Golden Jubilee last year). We are very thankful for this generosity!

I ask for parents/caregivers help to please remind your children not to trespass on other peoples property if they are walking to school. If they do so then residents have the right to take action/report it, as it is trespassing. The Police have been contacted and are aware. Children also need to be aware that they are putting themselves in danger by doing this as they don't know what is on the other side of a fence (eg. a dog), Please, remind your children to not trespass and stick to the footpaths. We don't want to have to contact parents/caregivers about complaints from members of the public about students in uniform trespassing.

A friendly reminder about acceptable language at Tuakau College. We do not tolerate racial slurs, swearing at staff members or other students, etc. We expect respect from all students in this aspect. We want our students to do the very best in all things, and the use of unacceptable language at our kura is not a good foundation for life/work/etc. after students have completed their schooling.

Next term our winter sports codes will kick off and we wish all our students representing the school in these the very best! It makes us proud to see our students working in a team and collaborating while supporting each other to get the results they desire. A friendly reminder that students are representing our school in school uniform kit and therefore we expect a good behaviour and sportsmanship in every aspect of the sport - whether it be games, trainings, travelling to trainings, etc.

Another friendly reminder that when games are held on school grounds the school rules still apply to <u>everyone</u> on the grounds and therefore this means no smoking/vaping, no dogs or animals on site, etc.

We love to see whaanau there supporting our students and encouraging them and we know it means the world to your children when you are there watching them. They are however, only children, and so we ask that spectators are considerate of this and kind and respectful.

We say a massive thank you to all those who volunteer as referees/umpires for sports as we know that games cannot go ahead without them and we ask that students and spectators alike are respectful of them also. Thank you also to the parents/caregivers/members of community that step up and dedicate their time for our students as coaches, managers, etc. Thank you so much for this as it couldn't happen without you!

Earlier this month a Sports Handbook was emailed out to all parents/caregivers and we ask that you please read over this with your students so that they are aware of the schools expectations around sport. As stated in this handbook, it is expected that students will:

- Attend all timetabled classes.
- Expected to have no more than 5% unjustified absences.
- Meet homework and assessment deadlines.
- Wear the uniform correctly, at all times.
- Attend all practices/trainings and communicate with the adult in charge if unable to attend.
- Follow the Fair Play Rules, if playing sport.
- Pay for the activity (or make arrangements for regular payments) before the activity begins unless otherwise stated.
- Understand that curriculum work and school detentions take priority over extra-curricular activities.
- If a student is suspended or stood-down from school then they may not participate in the school activity and/or practice during the suspension and stand-down time. Discussion will be had regarding future participation at the return meeting with senior management.

By following the above criteria students can enjoy activities and be successful in all areas of their education. In cases where students do not meet the above standards, a student may be withdrawn from an activity. This may include practices and/or competitions for one or a number of weeks. This will occur after senior management have informed students and parents/caregivers have been notified.

Being a responsible social media user Te noho hei kaiwhakamahi pāpāho pāpori whai mana



As a community we are becoming increasingly aware of the effects that too much screen time and time on social media platforms are having on our youth. Studies have shown that the increase of mental health issues are linked to social media and online forums.

Other risks to be aware of are that they can limit a child's ability to develop optimally, can lead to childhood obesity, poor language development, sleep disorders, other mental health conditions, online grooming, child pornography and exposure to inappropriate content.

As your education provider we have been supported by the new government laws of no phones at school to try to mitigate the rise of these issues within school hours. However, it is a community issue and one that we need to collaborate on to get the best results for our tamariki. Therefore, we would like to request that as a community we take on the responsibility of implementing some boundaries around phone and device usage at home to assist in keeping our Tamariki as safe as we can.

Boundaries around technology will be different for every household and have to be ones that you, as whaanau, can be consistent with.

Below are some links for parents and caregivers to access information on guidelines on phone use and screen times, depending on age and stage of our tamariki. Road Safety around Schools Te haumaru huarahi huri noa i nga kura



We understand that the traffic congestion outside schools in the morning and afternoon peak times is frustrating. Not only that, but illegal parking puts our children at risk. We need you as our parents/caregivers to be considerate and be 'road safe' around our kura, for the safety of not only our students but also yourselves.

It is important that students wait in the designated bus bay area where it is safe for them to do so. It is also important they wait until the bus has stopped and the door has opened before getting on the bus. We have staff out in the bus bay scanning students on and off the bus so students are unable to get on the bus before they have been scanned.

We ask that parents/caregivers stick to the speed limit outside the school. We are aware that during school pick up time the area around both entrances to the school is extremely congested. We ask that, where and if possible, you consider collecting your child slightly after 3:15pm (eg. maybe 3:30pm) as this might help ease the congestion of every parent/caregiver turning up at exactly 3:15pm. Please be aware that the school buses are larger than cars and need extra space to turn. etc. so please be respectful and understanding of this as our children leave the school in the buses.

Please remember, it is ILLEGAL to park where there are yellow lines. If the Council checks parking around the school, you will be fined for parking where there are yellow lines. Please DO NOT park across driveways and block access to peoples houses. This is not acceptable and we ask for your co-operation in this.

A reminder that all students who walk to or from school MUST use public footpaths. DO NOT cut through private property as it is a health and safety issue and you are trespassing. If owners of private property see you trespassing they are within their rights to take action and report it to the Police. No students are to cut through the farm next to the school (there can be bulls/stock in this paddock).

We appreciate your understanding and co-operation as we work together to keep our tamariki safe.
